WINGS is a diverse and inclusive network that brings a global perspective and sense of collective identity to philanthropy. It provides an indispensable platform for convening, connecting, knowledge sharing, peer learning and collaboration among a growing membership that represents philanthropy and private social investment in every region of the world.

#### Mission and vision

WINGS is a global network of grantmaker associations and philanthropic support organizations. WINGS strengthens, promotes and provides leadership on the development of philanthropy and social investment around the world. WINGS gives voice to the many cultures of giving and provides its members and other participants with information, knowledge, and peer exchange. Our vision is of a strong, global philanthropic community that strives to build more equitable and just societies around the world.

## Theory of change

At the heart of WINGS work is a theory of change that sees infrastructure organizations as essential to a strong philanthropic sector. These infrastructure organizations promote the core elements for philanthropy to thrive: an enabling environment, a culture of giving, the exchange of best practices, and a shared vision for the field. WINGS provides a much needed forum for them to connect with one another as peers, to share knowledge and to engage in thought leadership through convenings, publications and communities of practice. They become better equipped to promote and support the full engagement of private social investors, grantmakers and foundations, and unleash the full potential of civil society organizations for social good. Ultimately, this leads to the development of a strong global philanthropic community that contributes to build a more just and equitable society.

## **Dear Members and network participants**

The year of 2015 represented an important milestone for us, as it was the fifth year since incorporating WINGS as a fully-fledged non-profit membership association with offices in Sao Paulo, Brazil. As WINGS membership grew, so did our staff, our programs and the complexity of our activities.

In response to this new reality we initiated 2015 with a fresh Strategic Plan for the period 2015–2018, boasting an ambitious vision for the next four years, a theory of change, and three strategic areas to guide our work: leadership and advocacy; network building and engagement; and, knowledge and capacity development.

From convening peer learning events to building strategic partnerships to gathering and disseminating knowledge, WINGS has made significant strides toward being an inclusive and representative global platform to advance effective philanthropy in all its forms and highlight the rich diversity of global philanthropy. Experience tells us that meeting in person is very helpful in understanding our global network and the ways in which we can best work together. Consequently, in 2015 we carried out five in person meetings for our members.

2015 was also marked by a complex and troubling situation affecting the philanthropic sector — the increasing restrictions on funding and freedom of civil society organizations and its consequences on philanthropy. In response, WINGS actively contributed to discussions, facilitated a webinar, and mobilized the resources to host an in person meeting for members to further discuss this issue.



As philanthropy faces unprecedented challenges, we are confident that WINGS is well positioned to be a credible voice for global philanthropy. In the coming year we will carry out various interesting activities, including an in person meeting on the enabling – or disenabling – environment for philanthropy and the role of philanthropy support organizations in addressing barriers, two in person meetings to work on the development of an evaluation framework for our members, and we will start planning for our global convening, WINGSForum which will take place in Mexico in February 2017.

We would like to thank our members, partners and supporters for their integral role in the success of WINGS. Whether you are a paying member, a partner, or a funder, each of you are contributing to our network and we could not have achieved so much in the past five years without you.

We conclude with a special thank you to our Board of Directors and Staff, all of whom have been instrumental in strengthening WINGS.

## **Building the field**

## **Knowledge Sharing**

**Peer Learning Events:** Our peer learning events are co-hosted by members and partners around the world to share good practice and learn from the experiences of peers. The topics covered reflect the interests expressed by members. In 2015 we held five peer learning events focusing on:

- Social Return on Investment: In partnership with Social Value International, a WINGS member organization, and with the support of the German Association of Foundations and the Bosh Foundation, WINGS facilitated a full day meeting to share knowledge and best practice on social return on investment. Fourteen participants met at the headquarters of the Bosch Foundation in Berlin, which generously offered the meeting space.
- Evaluation Framework for Philanthropy Infrastructure Organizations: Following up on the recommendations of our 2014 report Infrastructure in Focus: A Global Picture of Organizations Serving Philanthropy, WINGS in partnership with DAFNE brought together seventeen members to work towards the development of and evaluation framework for infrastructure organizations.
  - The first meeting was held in Madrid, at the headquarters of the Botín Foundation and with the support of the Spanish Association of Foundations.
  - The second meeting was in Istanbul, hosted by TUSEV. By the end of the second meeting, participants had agreed on the baseline data for the evaluation framework. The work with continue in 2016, with the next meeting scheduled for early March in Lisbon.

I am highly impressed by the quality of discussion and dedication of the group!

- Global Philanthropy Data Charter: in partnership with the Foundation Center, WINGS carried out a peer learning event in Cape Town to discuss the principles, values and benefits of the Data Charter against their own research and to identify collaborative opportunities to improve philanthropy data collection and dissemination. Twenty-two participants attended the event which was generously sponsored by HGG NPO Sustainable Solutions/HGG Financial Group and Aleit Group.
- Private Social Investment in Latin America: in partnership with the Encuentros Ibero Americanos de la Sociedad, WINGS convened its members to discuss main issues and challenges of support organizations serving private social investment in Latin America and to launch the publication Private Funds for Social Transformation: Philanthropy and Private Social Investment in Latin America Today.

**Webinars:** Over 170 participants worldwide attended at least one of our 11 webinars in 2015. Webinars covered a wide variety of topics including Philanthropy and the Shrinking Space for Civil Society, Cultures of Giving, and the Sustainable Development Goals. Webinars are easily accessible on WINGS YouTube channel, and there were over 400 views of recorded webinars during the reporting period.

Philanthropy Data Network: The need for high quality data and reliable information on philanthropy has never been greater. Finding ways of combining multiple sources of data and information into meaningful knowledge remains a priority for us.

This year, in addition to peer learning events and webinars, WINGS worked on 3 publications:

- The Landscape of Support to Corporate Philanthropy launched on February 2016;
- Toolkit on Accountability and Transparency; and,
- Private Funds for Social Transformation: Philanthropy and Private Social Investment in Latin America.

**Knowledge Center:** Housing over 530 publications, our Knowledge Center provides a central location for our members to connect with information and expertise globally, by collecting, contributing and sharing digital knowledge.

## Membership

WINGS network is where members from diverse cultures of giving can connect and share knowledge. WINGS members are the foundation of our network; they share a deep commitment to philanthropy, and together as a group they represent the collective knowledge of the field. We ended 2015 with 79dues paying members which contributed a total of US \$65,250 in membership dues. Out target for 2016 is to engage 100 dues paying members.

#### Paving the way to an increasingly sustainable and responsive organization

Over the past four years, we have focused our sustainability objectives on growth and diversification of funding sources. We have been successful at generating revenue, reflecting the generous support from foundations and from our members. We have also been successful in leveraging inkind support for our programme activities. We are continuously evaluating our efforts for long term sustainability and increased revenue, so we can adequately fund our activities and plan for the future.
